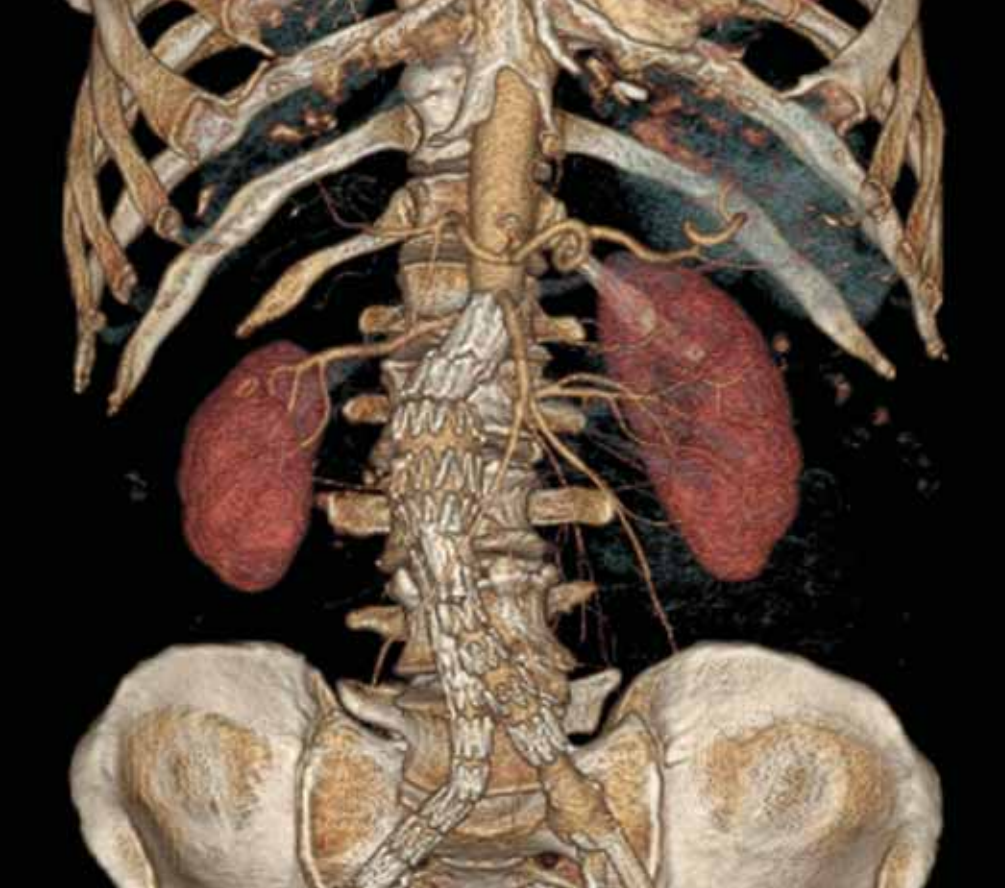

## Grand View Welcomes Twins Maggie and Mark

Kara McCreary was a “pro” at undergoing ultrasounds. Having brought four children into the world, she was eager to hear the heartbeat and see the image of her fifth baby. But none of her experience prepared her for the word Lane Moskoff, MD, of Stoneridge OB/GYN Associates spoke: “twins.”

“Twins were such a surprise,” Kara said. “I laughed. I didn’t know what else to do. I was in shock.” The news also astonished Kara’s husband, Brian. At the same time, however, the couple was delighted.

Twins put Kara’s pregnancy at greater risk for complications, so Kara’s obstetricians at Stoneridge suggested she consult with a perinatologist, or maternal-fetal medicine specialist. Perinatologists specialize in the diagnosis, treatment, and ongoing care of expectant mothers and their unborn babies who may be at high risk for special health problems.

A busy mother, Kara preferred to receive most of her prenatal care in Sellersville and hoped to deliver at Grand View. Her perinatologists worked closely with her obstetricians to make this possible.

Near the end of her pregnancy, Kara underwent frequent ultrasounds to monitor the babies’ growth and development. Images showed that the smaller twin, whom they had named Mark, was not growing adequately, so Kara’s physicians scheduled a C-section. Nicholas Lindberg, MD, and Michael Chmielewski, MD, delivered the twins at 34 weeks on August 25, 2008, far short of Kara’s October 2 due date.

Mark weighed in at 4 pounds, 6 ounces. His sister, Maggie, was 5 pounds, 4 ounces. Specialists from the Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia were on-site at Grand View to care for these newborns and provide for their special needs. “I was so happy they didn’t need to be transferred,” Kara said.

The Outpatient Center at Sellersville has been awarded an accreditation after a recent survey by the American College of Radiology (ACR). The center is now a designated Breast Imaging Center of Excellence according to the Commission on Quality and Safety and the Commission on Breast Excellence.

An ultrasound shows the twins. "The technologist used to say, 'Look at Maggie, she has chubby cheeks,'" Kara said. "Mark was harder to see because Maggie was sitting on top of him."



Maggie was released from the hospital one week after her birth, while Mark stayed a week longer. Leaving him was the hardest part of Kara's experience. "I was so emotional because I had never left the hospital without my baby before," Kara said. "The nurses were wonderful. They told me I could call them any time, day or night. Once in the middle of the night, I just started crying. My husband and I called and spoke with the nurses. We knew Mark was in excellent, caring hands. That was very comforting."

By their first birthday, Maggie and Mark were crawling at a fast clip. The twins' older siblings – Karlie, 13; Josh, 11; Matthew, 8; and Jason, 4 – are having a blast keeping up with their youngest family members.

### GRAND VIEW MEDICAL PRACTICES MATERNAL-FETAL MEDICINE TO OFFER PERINATOLOGY SERVICES AT GVH

High-risk pregnancies are a reality for one in five couples. About 20 percent of the time, the problem is a pre-existing condition in the mother, such as diabetes or heart disease. In other cases, complications arise during pregnancy – for example, we discover multiple babies, or the mother develops diabetes or goes into early labor.

Beginning in November, perinatologists will be at Grand View two days a week to consult with women at high risk for complications during pregnancy. They will offer outpatient appointments at the hospital and deliver consulting services to inpatients and their physicians. The perinatologists will use high-level ultrasound to evaluate fetal abnormalities, as well as provide genetic counseling.

### BIRTH AND FAMILY CENTER DOUBLES IN SIZE

While many hospitals are closing their maternity units, we are nearly doubling the size of our Birth and Family Center to 25,500 square feet, at a cost of approximately \$7 million. Last year, we began renovating existing space into a new Maternity Post-Partum Unit. Opened in August, it offers a beautifully expanded nursery, plus a special care nursery for critically ill infants, a cozy family waiting area, and attractive private and semi-private rooms.

Our Labor and Delivery Unit is growing in size as well. To be completed in May 2010, it will include new labor and delivery rooms, a second operating room for Cesarean (C-section) births, and examination and consultation rooms.



## Maureen's Fight against Inflammatory Breast Cancer

The stereotypical bartender listens patiently as patrons bare their souls. Coopersburg Fire Company bartender Maureen Carney gained heightened compassion for her customers' troubles as she faced challenges of her own. At age 36, she was diagnosed with an aggressive form of breast cancer.

"Having a life-threatening disease puts things into perspective," she said. "I appreciate everything and can help my customers find positive things in their own lives. When they hear my story, their own problems don't seem so overwhelming."

About a year ago, Maureen experienced sharp pains in her breast that worsened with her menstrual periods. She saw nurse practitioner Elizabeth Grusmeder-Smith of Stoneridge OB/GYN Associates, who urged Maureen to have a mammogram immediately. Results and further testing revealed cancer.

Maureen selected Bux-Mont Oncology/Hematology Medical Associates for treatment. Her medical oncologist, Alan Kaufman, MD, diagnosed her as having inflammatory breast cancer (IBC) – a rare but very aggressive type of disease in which cancer cells block lymph vessels in the skin of the breast. It is called "inflammatory" because the breast often looks swollen and red and may be characterized by an inverted nipple. More prevalent among younger women, IBC accounts for 1 to 5 percent of all breast cancer cases in the U.S.

To make matters worse, a PET scan revealed tumors in Maureen's lymph nodes and liver – a sign the cancer had spread to other parts of her body. To combat the disease, Dr. Kaufman developed an aggressive treatment plan that included

chemotherapy to prevent further growth and spread of the tumors and radiation therapy to reduce or eliminate tumors in her lymph nodes and breast. Given Maureen's young age, he suggested she receive a second opinion. He explained that Grand View is a Fox Chase Cancer Center Partner, and one of the benefits of this distinction is a Second Opinion Service.

Grand View's Second Opinion Service Coordinator Susan Tisdale Lezoche scheduled an appointment for Maureen at Fox Chase Cancer Center and provided physicians there with medical records needed to review Maureen's case. "Fox Chase did a thorough evaluation of the recommendations Dr. Kaufman made," Maureen said, "and supported the plan of treatment he outlined."

Maureen's treatment began with several rounds of chemotherapy at the Infusion Center located in Grand View's Outpatient Center at Sellersville. She continues to receive radiation treatment at Grand View under the supervision of radiation oncologist

## THE POWER OF PET/CT CLOSE TO HOME

PET/CT combines the power of positron emission tomography (PET) with computerized tomography (CT). Setting a new standard of imaging excellence, the system makes it possible to obtain anatomical and biological data in *one exam*. This non-invasive procedure is helping physicians diagnose and treat certain diseases. PET/CT is recognized as one of the most effective technologies for diagnosing certain cancers and staging malignant diseases.

Whereas CT provides a detailed picture of the internal anatomy, PET images biochemical activity. Unlike any other imaging technique, PET can accurately identify if a tumor is benign or malignant – thus avoiding surgical biopsy when the PET scan is negative. A PET scan images the entire body, indicating if the cancer has spread to other areas (distant metastases). If this occurs, the physician can alter a patient’s treatment plan. PET shows the extent, or staging, of many types of cancer. This enables the physician to monitor the progression of disease and to determine the effectiveness of treatment, particularly chemotherapy.

**How Does PET/CT Work?** Patients are injected with a very small amount of radioactive material attached to glucose (sugar). Although all cells use glucose, cancer cells use more glucose as they grow. PET/CT scans reveal metabolic “hot spots” – often indicating rapidly growing tumors. Performed by skilled technologists, the actual scan takes about 30 minutes. Afterwards, patients may resume normal activities.

Martin Hightower, MD. To reduce her cancer risk, she decided to have a double mastectomy even though the cancer had not spread to the left breast. Surgeon John Pagan, MD, performed the surgery.

Maureen has never second-guessed her decision to receive all of her treatment at Grand View, despite urgings from her Drexel Hill family to seek treatment in Philadelphia. Maureen knew she would receive high-quality treatment at Grand View without the hassles of the city. She also felt comforted by the caring attitude at Grand View.

“The staff here is wonderful,” she said. “After surgery, my stay was awesome. The nurses were great. I have no complaints. I recovered so quickly. The night of my surgery, I walked out to the nurses’ station and started handing out cookies.” Maureen also speaks highly of Breast Care Coordinator Suzanne Campbell’s devotion to her job. Suzanne assisted Maureen with scheduling tests and appointments.

A PET scan taken in April showed Maureen is now cancer-free. That is miraculous given the ferocity of IBC. Although statistics show that IBC is an aggressive type of cancer, Maureen doesn’t give too much credence to the numbers. They do not predict a person’s outcome. “I’m an individual, not a statistic,” Maureen said. “It’s been a long haul and it’s not over yet. Someone has survived every type of cancer, no matter how menacing. I’m determined to beat the odds and talk about it when I’m 80.”

## One Surgeon's Experience as a Patient

Ernest Cope III, MD, would rather walk into the operating room than roll in on a gurney. But due to a skiing accident earlier this year, the experienced orthopaedic surgeon was thrust into the patient role.

Dr. Cope, known to his friends and colleagues as Trey, was attending a church youth group retreat at Ski Sawmill, a resort near Williamsport, on February 28. Gliding effortlessly down the slopes, he decided to take a jump. He landed badly and knew instantly he had torn his ACL. An acronym for anterior cruciate ligament, the ACL is one of the knee ligaments that joins the upper leg bone with the lower one. It keeps the knee stable.

“I realized the implications as soon as it happened,” he said. “I couldn’t stand on my left leg, so I skied down the slope on my right.” Upon reaching the bottom, he was unable to walk more than three steps without his knee buckling. Consequently, he hopped about the length of a football field to his car, not an easy feat in ski boots.

On the ride home that evening, he called his business partner, fellow surgeon James Bumgardner, MD, of Upper Bucks Orthopaedics. They met in the office the following morning. Dr. Bumgardner examined his colleague and drained nearly 70 cc (about a third of a cup) of blood from Dr. Cope’s knee. They discussed his options, of which Dr. Cope was already well-informed.

“I’ve often talked with patients who have torn their ACL and have opted not to have it repaired surgically. Some of them have done fine without it,” he said. As a result, he decided to wait and see how extensively his knee would heal without surgical intervention. Initially, he walked with crutches. As his knee improved somewhat, he was able to walk with a brace. “The experience gave me credibility with my patients, especially those who saw me with my crutches or brace,” he said.

Although Dr. Cope’s knee improved, it remained unstable, so he decided to have his ACL reconstructed surgically. The operation occurred April 6. “I could have gone anywhere for surgery but never considered any surgeon other than Dr. Bumgardner. Throughout my training and later in my role as orthopaedic surgeon, I’ve seen many surgeons operate, including some of the most prestigious experts in our field. I’ve also observed Dr. Bumgardner operate and have never seen any surgeon perform better technically. I had total confidence in him.”

Likewise, he had complete trust in Grand View’s operating room staff and post-surgical recovery staff. “I’ve worked with these nurses and anesthesiologists for years and have witnessed their competence first-hand.” His surgical experience proved his confidence was well placed. He received top-rate care and had very little pain.

He is currently undergoing rehabilitation through the Grand View Sports Medicine Program at the Sellersville Outpatient Center. He works out twice a week under the supervision of manager and physical therapist John Detwiler, knowing it takes about six months to fully recover.

Although he did not welcome his injury, it has increased his depth of knowledge. He explained, “Before the accident, I had knowledge through education. Now I have experiential knowledge. I understand that the timing of an accident is never good and plays havoc with your schedule. I can relate to the frustration patients feel when rehab doesn’t progress as quickly as they’d like or when they don’t get the results from working out that they did prior to an injury.”

“All and all, this experience has made me a wiser physician. I can better identify with many of my patients,” Dr. Cope noted.



### **JOINT REPLACEMENT TECHNOLOGY**

Advances in joint replacement are a major success in modern medicine. Today, materials in replacement parts can last up to 30 percent longer, which means an artificial joint can last a lifetime. “At Grand View, we offer advanced imaging technology and image-guided surgery, which allows patients a shorter hospital stay, faster recovery, easier rehabilitation, and a more complete return to their previous lifestyle,” said Joint Replacement Center Medical Director Paul Weidner, MD. New technology in prostheses has even led to gender-specific replacements and custom designs for a right and left knee.

## VASCULAR SERVICES IN DETAIL

Grand View’s interventional cardiologists, interventional radiologists, and vascular surgeons provide expert diagnosis, treatment, and care to patients with circulatory diseases and disorders including aneurysms, carotid artery disease, and peripheral vascular disease. Minimally invasive techniques are used to repair aneurysms, open blocked arteries, and save limbs. We also treat chronic lower extremity conditions, such as thrombosis, phlebitis, and varicose veins.

## Vascular and Diagnostic Imaging

Diagnostic services consist of invasive and non-invasive imaging of the arterial, venous, and lymphatic systems – including diagnostic ultrasound and duplex scanning, magnetic resonance angiography, computed tomography (CT), angiography, magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), and spiral CT.

## CT SCAN REVEALS RESTRICTED BLOOD FLOW

An elderly woman had a sore on her leg that would not heal. A CT scan revealed that a damaged vessel was restricting blood flow to the skin. "It's like standing on a hose," explained interventional cardiologist J. Doyle Walton, MD. "A trickle of fluid was able to get through but the majority of fluid was blocked, creating pressure behind the blockage."



The left image shows the vessel near the knee joint prior to treatment. It appears as though the blood flow stopped. The right image shows the leg during the procedure. See the catheter and netted stent. The stent was left in the vessel to ensure the artery remains open, thus allowing blood to flow freely.

## Endovascular Procedures

Interventional cardiologists, interventional radiologists, and vascular surgeons employ less-invasive endovascular methods to treat even the most complex vascular conditions, all performed in our surgical suites.

## Vascular Surgery

Surgeons employ open surgical treatments when less-invasive endovascular procedures are not appropriate.

Grand View Hospital's stroke program recently received a gold achievement award from the American Stroke Association. The award recognizes Grand View's commitment and success in implementing a higher standard of stroke care by ensuring that stroke patients receive treatment according to evidence-based guidelines.

## Minimally Invasive Procedure for Varicose Veins

People who suffer from varicose veins often deal with throbbing pain, severe swelling, and heavy, tired legs. Grand View now offers radiofrequency occlusion – a minimally invasive procedure that treats varicose veins and their underlying cause, venous reflux, with little or no pain. Patients can walk away from the vein procedure and return to everyday activities, either at home or at work, typically within a day.

Physicians close the diseased veins by inserting a small tube, called a catheter, into a vein and heating the vein wall. This causes collagen in the wall to shrink and the vein to close. After the problem vein is sealed shut, blood then naturally re-routes to healthy veins.

"This is an exciting time for interventional radiologists to be involved in imaging and treatment of vascular disease," noted Edwin Martin, MD. "We are happy to be able to offer more effective non-surgical options than ever before."

## A Special Christmas Gift: A Repaired Artery

December 24, 2008 is one Christmas Eve that David Klingman, 54, will never forget. Instead of preparing for his custom holiday festivities, he was in the operating room at Grand View Hospital undergoing major surgery to repair a life-threatening condition.

David had an abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA), which occurs when the aorta – the large vessel that carries blood from the heart – develops a balloon-like swelling. Left untreated, the vessel where the aneurysm is located can weaken and may eventually rupture with uncontrolled bleeding, usually causing death.

David had learned of his aneurysm three years ago when he received an MRI to diagnose the cause of back pain. The scan revealed an aneurysm that measured about four centimeters. At that point,

physicians monitored David’s aneurysm through frequent CT scans. By fall 2008, the aneurysm grew to nearly five-and-a-half centimeters. Vascular specialist and surgeon Arthur Flatau III, MD, advised David to have an EVAR, or endovascular aneurysm repair – a less invasive procedure to repair aneurysms. (“Endovascular” means “inside a blood vessel”).

“I’m in construction so it’s important that I work when a job is available,” said David, who lives with his wife, two daughters, and two granddaughters. “I was concerned about my health, but I needed to keep food on the table. I asked Dr. Flatau if the surgery could wait until the project was completed,

## Betty’s Aneurysm

Betty McGinley, age 71, attended a lecture on abdominal aortic aneurysms (AAA) at Harleysville Senior Center last February. She wanted to learn about progress being made in the treatment of the condition because her father died of a complication related to AAA in 1991.

Following the lecture, offered by Grand View, Betty contacted her medical cardiologist, Todd Alderfer, MD. Given her family history, he suggested Betty have an ultrasound. It showed an “irregularity” so Dr. Alderfer advised Betty to have a CAT scan immediately. The test confirmed she has a very small aneurysm that is not bleeding or leaking. As a result, no treatment is currently necessary.

“I feel confident Dr. Alderfer will follow through with my treatment. Who knows if I would have learned of my condition had I not attended this program?” said Betty. “If it gets to a point where my aneurysm is going to blow, I’ll be taken care of.” Betty credits Harleysville Senior Center and Grand View for discovering she has an aneurysm. Her condition is being monitored.

but he advised against it. I decided to have the surgery on Christmas Eve so I could use the holiday break for recovery.”

During the procedure, Dr. Flatau made two small incisions in David’s groin to access the femoral arteries in his thigh. He then placed a small, strong, bendable tube – a catheter – into the vessel. The catheter was equipped with a stent graft, a tube composed of fabric supported by metal mesh. Using X-ray guidance, Dr. Flatau steered the catheter through the femoral arteries and into the aortic artery to the site of the aneurysm. The stent graft sealed the artery above and below the aneurysm. Stronger than the weakened artery, the stent graft allows David’s blood to pass through without pushing on the bulge.

“I was back to work in two weeks, and it was easy. I had just two, three-and-a-half-inch incisions,” he said. Months later, David feels like he has more energy than before the procedure and has even dropped 35 pounds. “I was worried before the operation,” he said. “I kind of felt like a walking time bomb. Now I feel better than ever.”

### DETAILED 64-SLICE CT SCANS

Medical imaging has made tremendous progress in the field of cardiology. The above image from our 64-slice CT scanner gives physicians a comprehensive view of a patient’s anatomy. Such images can be obtained in the time it takes the heart to beat just five times and are captured in real time.

In the image above, the netting-like material is a stent used to repair a damaged aortic artery.

# Caring for Kim's Body, Mind, and Spirit

To judge whether a hospital accomplishes its mission, one must evaluate how its staff treats all community members – from the privileged to those with little or no means. Figures and charts demonstrate charitable care, but real-life stories show compassion. This year, Grand View has been honored to help Kim Klotz, a 30-year-old mother of four young girls.

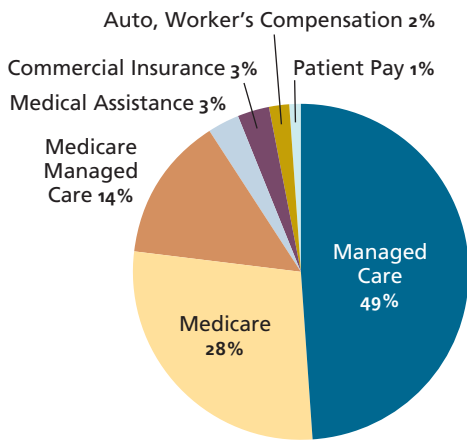
Kim suffers from terminal cervical cancer. Raised by a mother with a chronic, often debilitating disease, Kim's adolescence was dominated by emerging bipolar disease. She oscillated between being a caring daughter at her mother's bedside, a runaway trying to escape overwhelming responsibilities, and a resident of a teen group home. Her mother died at age 48, when Kim was just 20.

After becoming a mother herself, Kim continued to suffer from bipolar disease. She led a nomadic lifestyle, moving 11 times. Three years ago, while living in the Lehigh Valley, she was diagnosed with cervical cancer. She received treatment at a local hospital but relocated to New Jersey, making her health insurance invalid. She failed to get routine checkups.

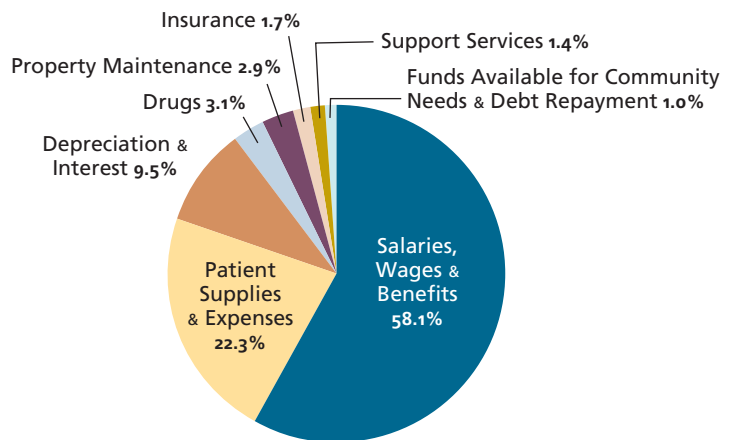
## CHARITY CARE POLICY

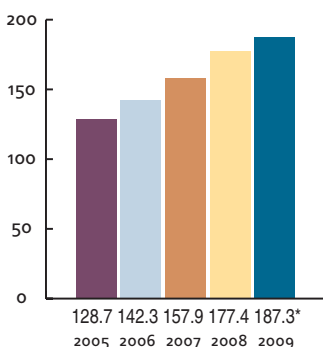
WHERE THE REVENUE COMES FROM



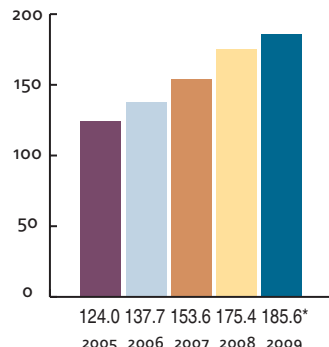
HOW THE REVENUE IS USED



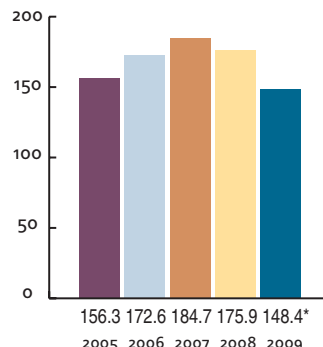
OPERATING REVENUE  
Millions of Dollars



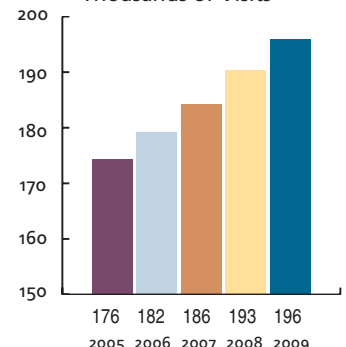
OPERATING EXPENSES

A year ago, she and her daughters moved in with her uncle in East Greenville. Her symptoms returned, which led her to Bux-Mont Oncology/Hematology Medical Associates and Thomas Siesholtz, MD, who informed Kim the cancer had advanced.

Given her illness, lack of transportation, and family care needs, Dr. Siesholtz thought Kim would be an ideal candidate for *Transitions in Care* – a program that provides palliative care to patients receiving curative treatment for serious illness. Led by a nurse practitioner with specialized training in comfort care, the program manages pain and other symptoms of serious illness and side effects of treatment. A specially trained team of doctors, nurses, social workers, and chaplains offers support.

Palliative care nurse practitioner Chris Hansen and social worker Jackie McIntyre were deeply involved in Kim's care. Chris was overwhelmed by the compassion of Kim's physicians and all of the hospital departments she encountered, including Radiation Oncology. Kim noted, "Since I've gotten involved with Grand View, things have gotten a lot easier. People are more like friends and are very upfront. Everyone makes me feel comfortable."

Maryellen Washko, a registered nurse in Radiation Oncology, said Kim makes an impression on

everyone she meets. "She was so sweet. You knew she wasn't feeling well, but she trudged through treatment, always wanting to get home to spend time with her girls. I looked out for her and made time to talk with her. I'd help her schedule appointments to make life easier. She is so appreciative of the support she received."

When Kim developed seizures, Dr. Siesholtz enlisted the assistance of neurologist Jessica Feldman, MD, who upon hearing Kim's plight, quickly agreed to manage her neurologic disease. She is one of many physicians eager to assist the young mother. "Kim is one example of a patient whom we have embraced, respected, and treated with dignity," said Chris. "We fully care for her body, mind, and spirit."

Jackie connected Kim with *The Open Line*, a community not-for-profit program in which volunteers transport patients to appointments. She even worked with the *Dream Foundation* and *Memories of Love* to arrange a family trip to Disney World. But Kim was afraid to fly, so Jackie contacted Budget Rent-A-Car in Quakertown, whose owner picked up car rental and gas fees. The family had a wonderful trip.

Kim's illness and the compassion of Grand View's staff have changed her outlook. "I was so depressed and miserable throughout my life. Ironically, since I've had cancer, I haven't been depressed. For some strange reason, it's the opposite," she said. "Having cancer taught me to appreciate my kids, how bright and well-behaved they are. I've become a better mother, and I'm trying to make sure they're well off when I'm gone."

Jackie is helping the girls to cope with their mother's illness and has arranged for a counselor to speak with them. Chris is working with Kim's doctors to coordinate her physical needs and has recently transitioned her care to Grand View's hospice program. "Kim's care showcases what makes Grand View genuinely special," said Chris. "She has guardian angels here. She's a living testament to the fact that we're a community hospital, and each community member is precious to us."



## Don and Linda Hagey Run a Family Business That Gives Back

In 1936, Clarence Hagey ushered in the age of school busing when he purchased his first bus and started transporting children from the overcrowded one-room Franconia Township School to the more spacious Morwood School. It would be his first contract with the Franconia Township School Board. The second milestone that year was the arrival of Clarence and Elsie's second son, Donald, who today finds himself in the driver's seat as president of the family business that has spanned 73 years.

Don and his wife, Linda, have worked hard to build Transportation Services, the school-bus part of the business, and Hagey Coach, the touring part, into exceptional organizations serving two distinct audiences. During the school year, they use 155 buses to safely move 7,000 children across the Souderton Area School District, as well as other public and private schools. Year round, the touring side of the business provides get-aways to points along the eastern seaboard and east of the Mississippi. A favorite destination is Broadway in New York City. Don says, "It is not uncommon for us to have 11 coaches in New York City on a given day."

While the economy has diminished tourism in many locales, Linda, the secretary/treasurer of the company, reports that they have seen only a slight downturn in the number of people who take a trip with them. "We offer affordable travel. Not every coach is full, but we haven't had to cancel many tours!" reports Linda.

"We absolutely love the work that we do every day, but it means that we are not able to give of our time as volunteers to worthwhile organizations like Grand View Hospital," says Don. "And I have many reasons to appreciate the doctors and nurses at Grand View." Starting at age 16 with an appendectomy, Don has been a regular patient at the hospital. He has survived both cancer and a heart attack. Together, Linda and Don work out at the cardiac rehab facility at the Grand View Hospital Outpatient Center at Sellersville.

Linda is quick to relay the story of their son, Jesse, who at age three contracted pneumonia and was gravely ill. Joseph Girone, MD, and the pediatric department at Grand View pulled him through. Today, Jesse works at keeping the buses healthy in the garage of Hagey Coach and Transportation Services. Don and Linda know how fortunate they are to have their family involved with the business. Their daughter, Tanya, manages the human resources department while nephews Brian and Blake run the Hagey Coach side of the business.

At Grand View, we are most grateful for Don and Linda's philanthropy, which has transcended all seasons and economic downturns, and has been given simply in support of the needed services of their community hospital.
